

#### WE WILL REMEMBER THEM REMEMBRANCE DAY – NOV. 11<sup>TH</sup>

Passchendaele and Vimy, Ortona and Juno Beach, Hill 677 in Korea. These names tell of courage, sacrifice and unspeakable horrors. The names of young men etched into the cold stone of headstones and war memorials tell the cost.



Today, on Remembrance Day, we gather at cenotaphs in communities big and small to lay a wreath, to pause in silence.

We honour the Canadian soldiers who headed off to muddy battlefields, the pilots who went aloft, the sailors and merchants mariners who went to sea to fight in two World Wars and Korea.

Some 116,000 of them never came home to the loved ones they left behind.

We remember them all and give thanks for their selfless sacrifice.

We honour, too, the 113 Canadians who have lost their lives in 53 proud years of peacekeeping.

And we honour the 58,000 Armed Forces members who serve today, including the 1,382 deployed overseas in the war against terrorism.

This country's military has come under fire recently as being underfunded and ill-equipped to meet modern-day challenges. But the resolve and courage of the people in the forces is not in question. Never has been, either. Canada has never shirked from the dangerous duty of standing up for freedom around the world.

The valour of Canada's fighting forces in World War I lifted this young nation from under Britain's shadow. That valour has been displayed time and again since – in World War II, Korea, the Persian Gulf and the Balkans.

It's been many years since the guns fell silent in the first great conflict. Canadians have paid tribute every November since.

But in fact, we pay tribute every day by going to work and to school, by speaking out by voting – the freedoms and rights we too often take for granted are the legacy of a society Canadian troops fought for and left to us.

Today, the veterans of these past wars will join in the Remembrance Day ceremonies, standing proud with medals on their chest, many with tears in their eyes. Their ranks grow smaller every year. The torch is being passed to the next generation.

Let's not fail them. Remember them and the comrades lost in battles in distant places.

And never forget the sacrifices that built this country.

#### STATEMENT BY CARDINAL THOMAS COLLINS, ARCHBISHOP OF TORONTO, RE ANNOUNCEMENT OF PAPAL VISIT TO CANADA

I am most grateful that Pope Francis has accepted the invitation of the Bishops of Canada for a pastoral visit to advance the healing and reconciliation journey with the Indigenous Peoples of this land.

I reiterate the unequivocal apology of the Canadian bishops from earlier this year as we sorrowfully acknowledged the historical and ongoing trauma and the legacy of suffering and challenges faced by Indigenous Peoples that continue to this day. We affirm our commitment to walk with the Indigenous people on the lengthy path of healing and dialogue. I pray that the visit of the Holy Father will provide a space for that journey to continue through authentic encounters of compassion, understanding and reconciliation.

To assist in establishing the foundation for his pilgrimage to Canada, later this year, from December 17-20, the Holy Father will welcome a delegation of Indigenous survivors, Elders, knowledge keepers and young people at the Vatican. Over the course of several days, through authentic listening and dialogue, Pope Francis will hear directly from those who have suffered.

I invite the faithful of the Archdiocese of Toronto to join me in prayer for all those who suffer from the legacy of the residential school system. We pray also for the delegates who will visit with the Holy Father in December. Finally, we keep Pope Francis close in prayer. May he be blessed with good health and strength to prepare him to join us at the appropriate moment to continue our journey of healing and reconciliation together.

#### STEWARDSHIP REFLECTIONS Offering our All

In the Gospel this Sunday we hear the account of the poor widow's treasury offering. Jesus observes many wealthy people put in large sums of money yet He only praises the lowly widow for her contribution of two small copper coins. He exclaims, "truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had." (Mark 12:43).

We can learn a great lesson in stewardship through the example of this widow who symbolically offered her entire life through her small monetary offering. We too are called to give our entire lives to God. We shouldn't imitate the wealthy people in the Gospel and give from what we have leftover. Rather, we should give the "first fruits" of our time and our talents because we want to show God how grateful we are for all He has given us.

Additionally, by giving everything she had, the widow is inherently saying "God I trust that you will take care of me." As stewards, do our sacrifices show that we trust God? To trust God means knowing that even though our time spent in the parish might mean we have less time for work or other commitments, that God will still bless us abundantly. Let us strive to give all we can and trust that God will take care of all our needs, for St. Paul says, "God loves a cheerful giver." (2 Corinthians 9:7).

#### Summary

We can learn a great lesson in stewardship from the widow who put in all she had, two small copper coins, into the treasury. We shouldn't imitate the wealthy people in the Gospel and give from what we have leftover. Rather, we should give the "first fruits" of our time and our talents because we want to show God how grateful we are for all He has given us.
