CATHOLIC EDUCATION WEEK MAY 2 – 7, 2021

Catholic Education Week 2021 begins on Sunday, May 2, 2021. The Catholic schools in our parish will engage in a series of events to celebrate the ongoing gift of publicly-funded Catholic education. You are invited to learn about the various celebrations that are happening in your children's school, and are welcome to attend, if possible. Publicly funded Catholic education has existed in Ontario since 1841 and its graduates have served Ontario and Canada very well. The current generation of students in our publicly funded Catholic schools will serve with the same spirit and generosity as their previous generations.

This year's Catholic Education Week theme is, "Nurturing Hope."

The theme for Catholic Education Week 2021 was inspired by the following considerations:

- Recognition of the special Year of Laudato Si' which will run through May 24, 2021, announced by Pope Francis on May 24, 2020, the fifth anniversary of his papal encyclical, "On Caring for Our Common Home."
- In the face of the ongoing reality of the COVID-19 pandemic, a strong desire by the planning committee, along with those consulted, and supported by feedback from the survey, for continuity with the theme for Catholic Education Week 2020, *Igniting Hope*, which has served so well during the spring recess from in-

school instruction.

- The challenges to personal and spiritual well-being posed by the uncertainty and physical isolation of the current global crisis makes the timing and the concerns of Mental Health Week, which takes place during the same week as Catholic Education Week, all the more relevant.
- Ongoing recognition of the Truth & Reconciliation Commission and the relevance of Indigenous culture and spirituality to the spirit of Laudato Si.

WORDS TO WALK BY LOCK THE DOOR

"So, if the son frees, then you will be truly free."

John 8:36

Remember when you did *that*? It was awful and there are plenty of people to remind you of it. But the past is history. It can't be changed. It's your choice to either *live in it* or *leave it*. There are three ways to keep from getting stuck in the mud and mire of the past: *Face it*. *Replace it*. *Erase it*.

Face it. The past, though once real, is an illusion. Over and done. You have to stop carrying it around, talking about it, and allowing others to bring it up. Release its power. Say, "Yeah, I did that. But it doesn't define who I am now."

Replace it. Allow the wounds from the past to heal. Letting them fester only encourages more anger, resentment, bitterness, and hatred. Work toward peace with those who've hurt you. Replacing it means you no longer let the past infect the present.

Erase it. Read Philippians 3:13-14. Saint Paul demonstrates a healthy way to deal with the past. "Forget what lies behind you, but move forward to what lies ahead." It's called spiritual amnesia.

We are more than our yesterday; embrace this moment by giving it your full attention. Persevere, and resist being dragged back into your past.

Homework: Share these words with someone bogged down by the past: Yesterday is history; tomorrow is a mystery; today is a gift – that's why they call it a present.

1st Reading: Acts 9.26-31 2nd Reading: 1 John 3.18-24

Gospel: John 15.1-8 – Jesus the True Vine

Abiding in Christ

In today's Gospel we are invited to reflect on the image of Jesus, the true vine. Jesus says "Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me." As stewards, there is much to be gleaned through reflecting on this passage.

Firstly, Jesus desires to abide in us. He does this whenever we receive Him in the Eucharist. In the same way, we are called to abide in Him by prayerfully placing our very selves in His presence, whether it's through praying in our rooms or before the Blessed Sacrament. This close relationship with

Jesus is where our stewardship originates and is sustained. Jesus bluntly proclaims that we can do nothing without abiding in Him first.

As stewards, more than the actual works we perform, we are giving other people Christ through our time and talents. We can only give what we have first received. Therefore, it is of paramount importance that we focus on our prayer life above all. For example, before we plan on giving our time to a fellow parishioner and journeying with them, let us say a prayer asking God for the strength to work through us. Similarly, before we offer up our talents through various ministries in the parish, we should try to say a prayer asking that our works may point others to Christ, not to ourselves. Therefore, through abiding in Christ we may share His love and presence with others.

Summary

In today's Gospel Jesus says "Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me." We can abide in Jesus by placing ourselves in His presence whenever we pray and He likewise abides in us, especially through receiving Him in the Eucharist. This close relationship with Jesus is where our stewardship originates and is sustained so let us never fail to go to Him before we offer up our time and talents to the parish.

BORN AGAIN BY PAT MARRIN

"Unless one is born of water and the Spirit he cannot enter the kingdom of God" (John 3:6). John 3:1-8

The design of Luke's Gospel and Acts of the Apostles was once described as an hourglass on its side, with the narrative of Jesus life narrowing in focus to his death and then expanding again as the Apostles take the mystery of the resurrection and Pentecost into the world. Acts also



parallels the story of Jesus with the ministry of his disciples. What he did, they do. He healed the sick; the Apostles heal a cripple. He escaped from the tomb; they walk free from prison to proclaim the Gospel. Jesus is the beginning of a transformation meant to reach the ends of the earth. His death and resurrection offer the pattern for every Christian disciple.

The Paschal Mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection is an event that reveals the promised passage from life through death to new life. Baptism ritualizes this life-long process of dying to self to live for others, the secret of how we reclaim our original state and the image and likeness of God. Jesus revealed what a human being is meant to be. Discipleship is about becoming our true selves. But this transformation is possible only by God's gift. Grace perfects nature. We must be recreated by the Holy Spirt. It is like being reborn.

The fourth Gospel presents the brilliant scholar Nicodemus as someone who is still in darkness. He comes at night to encounter Jesus but cannot grasp how rebirth in the Spirit is necessary to transcend his human limits. He cannot imagine an adult re-entering the womb to be born again. Yet this image describes the radical difference between material existence and new life in the Spirit. The scene described may well be a post-resurrection encounter as the faithful Pharisee stands at the threshold of transformation, struggling to grasp the new life Jesus is offering him. He represents the rabbinic Judaism being invited to faith in Christ. Christians are already living the resurrection even as they live in this world. They have passed from death to new life, now free to preach as the Apostles can, unafraid of any attempt to contain or intimidate them from proclaiming peace, justice and compassion.

Easter People are supposed to be daring, fearless and free. They have seen the end of the story in the middle, and they know that nothing can separate them from the love of God in Christ Jesus. What Jesus accomplished by his death and resurrection is the Good News they now live and take to the ends of the earth.

On Saturday, May 8 at 10 a.m., His Eminence, Thomas Cardinal Collins, Archbishop of Toronto, will ordain our two transitional deacons, Rev. Mr. Arthur Lee and Rev. Mr. Andrew Taylor, with the Sacrament of Holy Orders as they become priests to the Archdiocese of Toronto. This wonderful event will take place at St. Michael's Cathedral Basilica and the faithful are all encouraged to join us via the cathedral's livestream.

Rev. Mr. Arthur Lee was born in Quebec, moved to Oakville where he grew up. He attended Queen's University to study Mathematics and Engineering. Upon returning home from university, he became more involved in his church, St. Andrew Kim Parish, through the Choice Weekend, choir, Legion of Mary and bible study groups. He was asked by the associate priest if he ever thought about becoming a priest. Arthur entered St. Augustine's Seminary in 2014.

Rev. Mr. Andrew Taylor, the fourth of eight children, was born in Barrie and grew up in Aurora in a home where the importance of faith, prayer and the sacraments were strongly emphasized. He attended Brebeuf College School. While in grade 10, Andrew encountered Christ through the Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Eucharist and began to hear a call to the priesthood. He began his formation at Serra House in 2011 and then joined St. Augustine's Seminary in 2015.
