Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you... Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid. John 14:27

WHAT GIVES US PEACE? What keeps our hearts from being troubled or afraid?

One answer that touches me on this Mother's Day I heard from a lovely older woman named Betty. It was in a summer program class I was teaching at Notre Dame, and we were talking about dealing with troubles in life: difficulties, challenges, losses. Betty shared with us a process that really helped her. She said, "Someone once taught me this secret: When we are sad, in pain, very worried about something, ask: 'Could this be labour?' And then, instead of fighting the pain or sadness of fear, give in to it, letting it take you to the birthing. Surrendering to the birthing brings with it hope, a trust than some new life is coming to your soul, is coming to the world."

Mothering God, source of life for all of us, help us trust that when we are troubled and afraid, you are with us helping us give birth to life.

On Saturday, May 8 at 10 a.m., His Eminence, Thomas Cardinal Collins, Archbishop of Toronto, will ordain our two transitional deacons, Rev. Mr. Arthur Lee and Rev. Mr. Andrew Taylor, with the Sacrament of Holy Orders as they become priests to the Archdiocese of Toronto. This wonderful event will take place at St. Michael's Cathedral Basilica and the faithful are all encouraged to join us via the cathedral's livestream.

Rev. Mr. Arthur Lee was born in Quebec, moved to Oakville where he grew up. He attended Queen's University to study Mathematics and Engineering. Upon returning home from university, he became more involved in his church, St. Andrew Kim Parish, through the Choice Weekend, choir, Legion of Mary and bible study groups. He was asked by the associate priest if he ever thought about becoming a priest. Arthur entered St. Augustine's Seminary in 2014.

1st Reading: Acts 10.25-26, 34-35, 44-48

2nd Reading: 1 John 4.7-10

Gospel: John 15.9-17 - No Greater Love

Laying Down our Lives (John 15:9-17)

"No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" are the beautiful words we hear from Jesus in the Gospel today. Jesus goes on to say that He no longer calls us servants but His friends. This is the radical truth of our faith. That God became man in order to befriend us and show His love for us through His death on the cross. As stewards we too are called to befriend Christ and lay down our lives for Him.

While the most literal way to lay down our life is to become a martyr for the faith, few are actually called to this type of death. It is more likely that we are called to lay down our lives by sacrificing our own wills and own comforts for the sake of the Kingdom. Pope Emeritus

Benedict XVI says, "The world promises you comfort, but you were not made for comfort. You were made for greatness." This is how we can display love's greatest act in our lives, to live not for ourselves but to live for the Gospel.

As stewards, we can live for the Gospel by giving our time and talents to our parish community. Our lives are made out of time, so to freely offer our time to help serve those in our community is a beautiful way to lovingly give to others. Likewise, to give of ourselves through the sharing of our talents is another way to lay down our lives for Christ and the Church. Let us strive to commit more faithfully to our call of stewardship.

Summary



CROSSING THE THRESHOLD OF FAITH BY PAT MARRIN

"Do not let your hearts be troubled" (John 14:1).

John 14:1-6

Today's Gospel reading is a favorite for funerals because of the comforting words Jesus offers his disciples: "Do not let your hearts be troubled." The final discourses in John are



placed at the Last Supper, where no doubt hearts were deeply troubled at the prospects of Jesus' death. This was his last Passover in this world, and he predicted his betrayal and abandonment as they left the upper room for Gethsemane. Darkness shrouded all human hope as the coming chaos approached and overwhelmed everyone.

The discourses are artful summaries of the theology of Jesus' identity and the transfer of his mission to his disciples, but they convey the sorrow and anxiety the

Twelve must have felt. The many prophecies Paul recounts in the synagogue in Antioch about how Israel's leaders failed to recognize Jesus and handed him over to Pilate culminated in Jesus' death. Only in hindsight did the disciples themselves realize who Jesus really was. His resurrection from the dead confirmed the prophecies and became the basis for the missionary preaching of the church.

We mark the Easter season with the same questions the disciples had about how the death and resurrection of Jesus opens the way for us to eternal life with God. Jesus died on the cross. We will die, and the fact of death remains for everyone. How is Jesus the way, the truth and life? Only when we exhaust all human hopes and sentiments about the power of love to overcome death, the comforting projections in art and poetry that affirm survival beyond the grave, do we enter the threshold of faith in the Person of Jesus as the only human being in history who has reversed the universal law of mortality to return from the dead. Do we believe him, in him, in the experience of early church, in the generations of believers who have gone before us, in the cloud of witnesses who await us on the other side of death?

"Do not let your hearts be troubled" is Jesus' invitation to faith. Live your faith by trusting that a full and generous journey through this world, giving yourself away, offering your time and energy and gifts in the community, responding to the needs of others, that this is not only the secret of a happy life here but also the beginning of eternal life. This is our path because Jesus is the Way. This is the Truth because Jesus said so. This is our life because Jesus is Life.

THIS IS A KEEPER

I grew up with practical parents. A mother, God love her, who washed aluminum foil after she cooked in it, then reused it. She was the original recycle queen before they has name for it. A father who was happier getting old shoes fixed than buying new ones. Their marriage was good, their dreams focused. Their best friends lived barely a wave away.

I can see them now, Dad in trousers, t-shirt and a hat and Mom in a house dress, lawn mower in one hand, and dishtowel in the other. It was the time for fixing things a curtain rod, the kitchen radio, screen door, the oven door, the hem in a dress. Things we keep. It was a way of life, and sometimes it made me crazy. All that re-fixing, eating, renewing, I wanted just once to be wasteful. Waste meant affluence. Throwing things away

meant you knew there'd always be more. But then my mother died, and on that clear summer's night, in the warmth of the hospital room, I was struck with the pain of learning that sometimes there isn't any more. Sometimes, what we care about most gets all used up and goes away... never to return. So... while we have it... it's best we love it... and care of it... and fix it when it's broken... and heal it when it's sick.

This is true. For marriage... and old cars... and children with bad report cards... and dogs with bad hips... and aging parents... and grandparents. We keep them because they are worth it, because we are worth it. Some things we keep. Like a best friend that moved away or a classmate we grew up with. There are just some things that make life important, like people we know who are special... And so, we keep them close! Good friends are like stars... You don't always see them, but you know they are always there. Keep them close!
